Jesus rescuing people.

sacrifice

Jesus' giving up his life for others.

resurrection

Coming back alive.

Holy Communion

Sharing of bread (body) and wine (blood) to symbolise Jesus' sacrifice.

Outcomes

- Outline the timeline of the 'big story' of the Bible, explaining how Incarnation and Salvation fit within it.
- Explain what Christians mean when they say Jesus' death was a sacrifice using theological terms.
- Suggest meanings for the narratives of Jesus' death and resurrection.
- Make connections between the Christian belief of Jesus' death as a sacrifice and how Christians celebrate Holy Communion.
- Show how Christians put their beliefs into practice.
- What is the value and impact of sacrifice in the world today and in own lives?

What did Jesus do to save human beings?

The Gospels give accounts of Jesus' life, death and resurrection.

Christians believe the 'big story' of the Bible is the need for God to save people.

Salvation includes restoring the relationship between God and humans.

The New Testament says that Jesus' death was somehow 'for us'.

Holy Communion is where Christians share a meal to remember Jesus' sacrifice.

Holy Communion is sometimes called 'Eucharist' or 'The Lord's Supper'.

In Holy Communion, bread represents Jesus' body and wine represents Jesus' blood.
